

HE CHARACTER HERCULES MAY OR MAY NOT HAVE BEEN BASED ON AN ACTUAL PERSON. REGARDLESS, THE STORIES OF HIS GREAT FEATS OF STRENGTH, COURAGE, AND RESOURCEFULNESS ARE AMONG THE MOST FAMOUS GREEK LEGENDS. THE GREEKS CALLED THEIR GREATEST HERO HERAKLES. BUT THE ROMANS KNEW HIM AS HERCULES. THIS LATTER TITLE HAS COME DOWN THROUGH THE AGES AS THE MOST POPULAR NAME FOR THIS LARGER-THAN-LIFE FIGURE. TO CREATE THE STORY OF HERCULES' TWELVE LABORS, AUTHOR PAUL STORRIE RELIED HEAVILY ON BOTH THOMAS BULFINCH'S THE AGE OF FABLE, FIRST PUBLISHED IN 1859, AND EDITH HAMILTON'S MYTHOLOGY, FIRST PUBLISHED IN 1942. BOTH OF THESE DREW THEIR MATERIAL FROM THE WORK OF ANCIENT POETS SUCH AS OVID AND VIRGIL, ARTIST STEVE KURTH USED NUMEROUS HISTORICAL AND TRADITIONAL SOURCES TO GIVE THE ART AN AUTHENTIC FEEL, FROM THE CLASSICAL GREEK ARCHITECTURE TO THE CLOTHING, WEAPONS AND ARMOR WORN BY THE CHARACTERS.






















# **GLOSSARY**

AMAZONS: a race of female warriors of Greek legend. Hippolyta, daughter of the god of war—Ares—is the queen of the Amazons.

ARTEMIS: the Greek goddess of the moon and of the hunt

BOAR: a male pig

HADES: the underground dwelling place of the dead in Greek mythology

HERA: the immortal wife of Zeus

HIDE: the skin of an animal

HIND: a female deer

IMMORTAL: a being that never dies

MARE: a female horse

MORTAL: a being that dies

NYMPH: in Greek mythology, goddesses of nature who are often represented as beautiful women living in the mountains, forests, trees, and waters

**ORACLE:** a priestess of ancient Greece through whom a god or gods were believed to speak

POSEIDON: the Greek god of the sea

TITAN: according to Greek
mythology, a race of giants that
ruled the earth before their
overthrow by the Greek gods

**IEUS:** king of the gods, father of Hercules

## **CREATING HERCULES: THE TWELVE LABORS**

To create the story of Hercules' Twelve Labors, author Paul Storrie relied heavily on both Thomas Bulfinch's The Age of Fable, first published in 1859, and Edith Hamilton's Mythology, first published in 1942. Both of these drew their material from the work of ancient poets such as Ovid and Virgil. Artist Steve Kurth used numerous historical and traditional sources to give the art an authentic feel, from the classical Greek architecture to the clothing, weapons and armor worn by the characters. Together, the art and narrative text bring to life the mightiest hero of Greek myth, whose battles against gods and monsters earned him a place on Mt. Olympus, the home of the Greek gods.

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# **ABOUT THE AUTHOR AND THE ARTIST**

PAUL D. STORRIE was born and raised in Detroit, Michigan and has returned to live there again and again after living in other cities and states.
